PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

The medical coding certificate program prepares students for a position as a coder in a hospital, physician office, clinic, long term care facility, and other healthcare settings. Coders review patient health information, extract data, and ensure appropriate codes are assigned for billing, internal and external reporting, research and regulatory compliance.

Admission Policy:

Students must have a high school diploma, or the equivalent (such as the California High School Proficiency Examination or GED), or, if not a high school graduate, students are at least 18 years of age.

A grade of C or higher is required in all courses in the certificate.

THE FUNCTIONS OF THE MEDICAL CODER INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO, THE FOLLOWING:

- Ensure the quality of medical records by verifying their completeness, accuracy, and proper entry into computer systems.
- Code symptoms, diseases, operations, procedures and other therapies according to recognized classification systems.
- Maintain and utilize a variety of health information computer applications including electronic health records, data abstracting, chart deficiency, coding, and registries.
- Query physicians when code assignments are not straightforward or documentation in the record is inadequate, ambiguous, or unclear for coding purposes.
- Keep abreast of coding guidelines and reimbursement reporting requirements.
- Participate in special projects related to coding education and training.
- Provide data to the health care facility staff in patient care evaluation, utilization review, planning, and research activities.
- Supervise health information service activities such as: data analysis, coding, and data quality and reporting.

Typically, individuals with a certificate in Medical Coding work in a hospital Health Information Management Department, but many work for physician groups, insurance companies, ambulatory care centers, and health information services vendors,

Successfully completing the program allows students to apply to take the AHIMA national qualifying examination for certification as a Certified Coding Associate (CCA).

According to the AHIMA 2012 Salary Survey, the average salary for a CCA is \$40,930. Salary will vary depending on the type, size, and geographic location of the healthcare organization. AHIMA reports professional coders with certification as a Certified Coding Specialist (CCS) have an average salary of \$53,862 - http://library.ahima.org/xpedio/groups/public/documents/ahima/bok1 050798.pdf.
