NEW STUDENT CHECKLIST

APPLICATION

Apply online at www.scccd.edu/apply. Select "Apply to Fresno City College." In 24-48 hours after you applied, you will receive a welcome email from SCCCD Admissions & Records with your student ID#. After 48 hours, if you do not receive your student ID#, call FCC Admissions & Records at 559-443-8604. Please be advised the California Community Colleges has partnered with ID.me to protect your identity and streamline the admissions process.

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2. To access your Student Portal & Email, use the login instructions on the back of this flyer. Please be advised SCCCD uses Multi-factor Authentication (MFA) for Student Portal log-in.

ORIENTATION

3 Complete the online orientation. Visit **www.scccd.edu/orientation**. You will need to know your Student Portal login information to complete this step. Once completed, it may take 1-2 business days to clear your orientation hold. For RTG seniors, you can access the orientation starting the first business day of December.

ADVISING/ASSESSMENT

4. Meet with an FCC counselor to select the appropriate level of classes to enroll in and complete your first semester Student Education Plan (SEP-A). Schedule your appointment by visiting www.fresnocitycollege.edu/academics/counseling and choose the student group that applies to you. For RTG seniors, advising will be scheduled by your school site.

REGISTRATION

5. Register for classes through Self-Service in your Student Portal. For instructions on how to register, visit www.fresnocitycollege.edu/register.

OTHER IMPORTANT STEPS:

- . Apply for financial aid by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.studentaid.gov or if you are undocumented or DACA, complete the California Dream Act Application (CA AB540 eligible students) at www.dream.csac.ca.gov.
- . To apply for scholarships, view important deadlines, and find more information about financial aid, go to www.fresnocitycollege.edu/financialaid.
- Pay your student fees by visiting www.fresnocitycollege.edu/fees or through Self-Service by the deadline.
- . Get your required textbooks by purchasing or renting them from the FCC Bookstore, visit www.fresnocitycollege.edu/bookstore.
- Check your student email daily through your Student Portal (see login instructions on back) for important information on fees, registration, deadlines, waitlisted courses, and more.

Initial Login Instructions

USERNAME: Your 7-digit Student ID number and @my.scccd.edu (Example 9999999@my.scccd.edu)

FIRST TIME PASSWORD:

- First letter of your FIRST NAME (UPPERCASE)
- First letter of your last name (lowercase)
- Your 6 digit date of birth in the mmddyy format

EXAMPLE:

Marcus T. Jones Martinez is born on January 5, 2007 and his ID number is 99999999. His login information would be:

Multi-factor Authentication

Multi-factor authentication (MFA) requires approval through a mobile push notification, phone call, or text message code after providing credentials (username and password). This keeps your account secure even if your password is stolen.

The first time you login to Microsoft Proofup, you will have to choose which method to use for Multi-factor Authentication. After a method is chosen, a summary page will appear where methods can be added, removed, or changed.

Change Your Password

After 45 days you will be prompted to change your password. A strong password is recommended, which must be a minimum of 12 characters and should not include your name or date of birth.

Next Steps CHECKLIST

Registering for classes is an important step in becoming a student at FCC, but there is still plenty to do after registration to prepare for the beginning of the semester. Here are some things you can do before classes start:

CHECK YOUR STUDENT EMAIL DAILY

Your email is the primary method the college uses to send you important information including financial aid, registration eligibility, and deadlines. To access your email, login through the FCC student portal.

APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at fafsa.gov or the California Dream Act application at dream.csac.ca.gov. If you need assistance, call the Financial Aid Office at (559) 442-8245 or email financialaidoffice@fresnocitycollege.edu. Additional scholarships and aid may be available, visit fresnocitycollege.edu/financialaid for more information.

PAY YOUR STUDENT FEES

Even if your tuition is covered by financial aid, there may be additional costs such as the health or ASB fee. Check the fee amount owed and the deadline in Self-Service or visit fresnocitycollege.edu/fees for more information, including how to submit your payment.

CHECK YOUR WAITLIST STATUS

If you are waitlisted for a class during registration, make sure to check your student email daily for a "Permission to Register" message. You will have four days (including weekends) to enroll in the class using Self-Service under the Academics tab, by clicking Register for Classes/View My Schedule link.

GET YOUR STUDENT ID

Your student ID has many benefits! Get your free student ID card in the Student Activities Office (in the Cafeteria Building, south side of the cafeteria).

PURCHASE YOUR PARKING PERMIT

If you need to park on campus, make sure to purchase a parking permit online at www.mycampuspermit.com/fresno-city.html

PURCHASE YOUR BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

Visit the Fresno City College Bookstore online through fresnocitycollege.edu/bookstore or on campus across from the cafeteria. You can use your class schedule to help you search and buy your books before classes start.

SCREEN SHOT YOUR CLASS SCHEDULE

Your class schedule is available in Self-Service which includes, the class name, date, time, location, and instructor's name. You can find your schedule under the Academics tab by clicking "Register for Classes/View My Schedule" link, then press the "Print" button above your schedule. Print or take a screen shot of your schedule for the first day of class. You can also find your class schedule on the dashboard in your student Portal.

Ram Ready is Fresno City College new student welcome event where you will receive all of the information and services that you need to start your semester. The CalWORKs Program is dedicated to providing equitable and inclusive services to parenting students seeking to become economically and socially empowered through education.

Eligibility

- · Must have children and/or dependents under the age of 18 and;
- Must be currently receiving cash aid assistance through a local county agency (i.e. Fresno County, Tulare County, etc.)

As a supplemental component of EOPS, CARE provides educational support services in addition to the college and EOPS services. CARE is a unique educational program geared toward the welfare recipient who desires a job-relevant education to break the dependency cycle. The program assists academically under prepared, low income, single household/parent (as determined by County Social Services) who receives cash aid for themselves and/or their child.

Eligibility

- Must meet all EOPS requirements
- · Be the single head of household (as determined by the county)
- · You or your child must be receiving cash aid (TANF/CalWORKs)

Disabled Students Programs and Services staff are committed to creating an accessible learning community where individuals with disabilities have an equal opportunity to pursue their educational goals. We strive to empower students, foster independence, and promote achievement through self-advocacy.

Eligibility

- Documentation from an appropriate licensed professional such as a doctor, nurse practitioner, psychiatrist, psychologist, licensed clinical social worker, ophthalmologist, audiologist, licensed speech professional, or neurologist
- Existing documentation from a medical facility or another public or private non-profit agency serving people with disabilities such as Department of Veterans Affairs, Department of Rehabilitation, Independent Living Center, or disability specific agency
- An Individual Education Plan (IEP) that was developed in high school, including any documentation or testing that was used to determine eligibility for the IEP
- A 504 Plan that was developed in high school, along with any medical documentation or testing that was used to determine eligibility
- Personal observation by a certificated DSP&S staff member in conjunction with the student self-report, may verify the existence of an observable disability
- Learning disability eligibility testing may be available for those who suspect that they have a learning disability, but who have not been formally assessed

EOPS (EXTENDED OPPORTUNITY PROGRAMS AND SERVICES) (559) 442-8231 • <u>www.fresnocitycollege.edu/eops</u>

EOPS is a comprehensive program that assists low-income and academically disadvantaged students pursuing academic and vocational goals that require additional financial and academic assistance.

Eligibility

- Be a resident of California or eligible for AB540 or DREAM Act
- Awarded the California College Promise Grant (CCPG) type A or B
- · Financial Aid package through Fresno City College
- Enrollment in at least 12 units for the semester in which you are applying at least 3 units at FCC – Unit exceptions for verified DSPS students
- Completed fewer than 45 college units in ALL college coursework including colleges outside of SCCCD
- Meet one EOPS educational factors see full list on EOPS website

NextUp

NextUp is an expanded EOPS program that provides various support for current and former foster youth. The purpose of NextUp is to encourage the enrollment, retention and transfer of current and former foster youth at Fresno City College.

Eligibility

- Be a current or former foster youth in California whose dependency was established on or after the youth's 13th birthday. This includes students with a dependency status established outside of California.
- Be no older than 25 years of age at the beginning of any academic year in which the student first enrolls in the program.
- Enrolled in at least nine units, however, students enrolled in fewer than nine units may be accepted into the program if enrollment is part of an education plan designed to move the student toward subsequent enrollment in at least nine units.



CHANGES EFFECTIVE FALL 2025

As a result of AB 1111, California Community Colleges are in Phase 1 of adopting a common course numbering system for all general education and transfer pathway courses. The purpose of the CCN system is to ensure that comparable courses across all community colleges have the same prefix, course number and course title. The goal is to streamline the transfer process from California Community Colleges to four-year postsecondary educational institutions and reduce excess credit accumulation.

The chart below provides a list of courses that will be offered throughout the SCCCD with a comparison of the current course prefix and number and the new course prefix and number based on the CCN system beginning fall 2025. 






- It's important to communicate with your instructors, counselors, coaches, and supervisors, especially if you need help or have questions.

- 1. Causing, attempting to cause, or threatening to cause physical injury to another person.
- 2. Possession, sale or otherwise furnishing any firearm, knife, explosive or other dangerous object, including but not limited to any facsimile firearm, knife or explosive, unless, in the case of possession of any object of this type, the student has obtained written permission to possess the item from the Vice President of Student Services or appropriate designee.
- 3. Unlawful possession, use, sale, offer to sell, furnishing, or being under the influence of, any controlled substance listed in California Health and Safety Code Sections 11053 et seq., an alcoholic beverage, or an intoxicant of any kind; or unlawful possession of, or offering, arranging or negotiating the sale of any drug paraphernalia, as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 11014.5. Marijuana is still federally illegal and therefore the use of recreational or medical marijuana will violate the District's Drug-Free Environment and Drug Prevention Program policy.
- 4. Committing or attempting to commit robbery or extortion.
- 5. Causing or attempting to cause damage to District property or to private property on campus.
- 6. Stealing or attempting to steal District property or private property on campus, or knowingly receiving stolen District property or private property on campus.
- 7. Willful or persistent smoking or vaping in any area where smoking or tobacco use has been prohibited by law or by regulation of the college or the District.
- 8. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.
- 9. Sexual assault or sexual exploitation regardless of the victim's affiliation with the District.
- 10. Sexual assault, defined as actual or attempted sexual contact with another person without that person's consent, regardless of the victim's affiliation with the community college, including, but not limited to, any of the following:
 - a. Intentional touching of another person's intimate parts without that person's consent or other intentional sexual contact with another person without that person's consent.
 - b. Coercing, forcing, or attempting to coerce or force a person to touch another person's intimate parts without that person's consent.
- 11. Rape, which includes penetration, no matter how slight, without the person's consent, of either of the following:
 - a. The vagina or anus of a person by any body part of another person or by an object.
 - b. The mouth of a person by a sex organ of another person.
- 12. Sexual exploitation, defined as a person taking sexual advantage of another person for the benefit of anyone other than that person without that person's consent, regardless of the victim's affiliation with the community college, including, but not limited to, any of the following:
 - a. Prostituting another person.
 - b. Recording images, including video or photography, or audio of another person's sexual activity, intimate body parts, or nakedness without that person's consent.
 - c. Distributing images, including video or photograph, or audio of another person's sexual activity, intimate body parts, or nakedness, if the individual distributing the images or audio knows or should have known that the person depicted in the images or audio did not consent to the disclosure and objected to the disclosure.

- d. Viewing another person's sexual activity, intimate body parts, or nakedness in a place where that person would have a reasonable expectation of privacy, without that person's consent, and for the purpose of arousing or gratifying sexual desire.
- 13. Committing sexual harassment as defined by law or by District policies and procedures in person or in an online environment and, when the victim or victims are associated with the District, whether or not the location is associated with the District.
- 14. Failure to ensure that he/she/ze has the affirmative consent of the other or others prior to engaging in sexual activity.
- 15. Engaging in harassing, discriminatory, or retaliatory behavior based on disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or any other status protected by law.
- 16. Engaging in abusive conduct or bullying against another individual through words or actions, including direct physical contact; verbal assaults, such as teasing or name-calling; social isolation or manipulation; and cyberbullying.
- 17. Willful misconduct that results in injury or death to a member of the campus community or which results in cutting, defacing, or other injury to any real or personal property owned by the District or on campus.
- 18. Disruptive behavior, willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, or the open and persistent defiance of the authority of, or persistent abuse of, college personnel interactions that are face-to-face, e-mail, phone or online.
- 19. Assault, battery, or any threat of force or violence upon a student or college personnel.
- 20. Cheating, plagiarism (including plagiarism in a student publication), or engaging in other academic dishonesty as defined by the College.
- 21. Dishonesty; forgery; alteration or misuse of District documents, records or identification; or knowingly furnishing false information to the District.
- 22. Unauthorized entry upon or use of District facilities.
- 23. Lewd, indecent or obscene conduct or expression on District-owned or controlled property, or at District sponsored or supervised functions.
- 24. Engaging in expression which is obscene, libelous or slanderous, or which so incites others as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on District premises, or the violation of lawful District regulations, or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the District.
- 25. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.
- 26. Unauthorized preparation, giving, selling, transfer, distribution, or publication, for any commercial purpose, of any contemporaneous recording of an academic presentation in a classroom or equivalent site of instruction, including but not limited to handwritten or typewritten class notes, except as permitted by any District policy or administrative procedure.
- 27. Other behavior or conduct constituting good cause for discipline including, but not limited to, violating District policies, regulations, procedures, and guidelines, disobeying lawful instructions and directions from District personnel, or violating the law.
- 28. Students who engage in any of the above are subject to the procedures outlined in AR 5520 titled Student Discipline Procedures.
