- ☐ I/we were not employed, had no income in 2023 and did not file a federal tax return.
Next step: Submit a signed Non-filing Statement for student (and spouse, if applicable).
- ☐ I/we were employed in 2023 but are not required to file a federal tax return.
Next step: List your employer(s) and the amount earned in 2023. Submit a copy of the W-2 for each employer AND a signed Non-Filing Statement.

HOW TO REQUEST IRS DOCUMENTS

COMPLETE ONE OF THE FOLLOWING:

Online Request: Get Transcript Online www.irs.gov

1. From IRS home page, click "Get Your Tax Record."
2. To access your tax records & transcripts in your Individual Online Account, click "Sign in to your online account."
3. Create an ID.me account and log in. *For this step you will need a government issued photo ID, an email address, and SSN.*
4. Then "Return Transcript" for 2023.

Phone Request: Get Transcript or Non-Filing Letter by Mail

1. Call the IRS at 1-800-908-9946.
2. Follow the prompts to enter your social security number and the numbers in your street address.
3. When prompted select "Option 2" or say "Return Transcript" and then enter "2023."
4. If successfully validated, the letter should be received by mail within 5-10 days from the time of the request.

Online Request: Get Non-filing Letter by Mail

1. From www.irs.gov, click "Get Your Tax Record."
2. Click "Get Transcript by Mail."
3. Enter the non-filer's SSN, date of birth, street address, and zip or postal code. Use the address currently on file with the IRS.
4. Click "Next", then select "Verification of Non-filing Letter" and in the Tax Year field, select "2023."
5. You can expect to receive a paper IRS Verification of Non-filing Letter at the address included within 5 to 10 days.

SPECIAL TAX SITUATIONS

Amended Tax Return:

Bring copy of Tax Return Transcript and a copy of the 1040X (Amended Tax Return), signed by taxpayer and stamped by IRS.

Victim of IRS Tax-Related Identity Theft:

1. Contact the IRS Identity Theft Protection Specialized Unit (IPSU) via telephone at (800) 908-4490.
2. After the IPSU authenticates tax filer identity, the tax filer must request the IRS to mail a Transcript Database View (TRDBV).
3. Submit a signed statement by the tax filer indicating that he or she was a victim of IRS tax-related identity theft.
