This Grammar Bytes is not about grammar; it is about the Hawaiian pronunciation of Merry Christmas. There are many reasons why Merry Christmas can be pronounced as Mele Kalikimaka, but here are the basics. There are only eight consonants in Hawaiian. No more than one consonant can be together, and every consonant must be followed by a vowel. Look below and compare Hawaiian with English to see if you can find the rules discussed above.






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
