#### **Apostrophe Rules:**

1) Apostrophes are used to show ownership:

"The car that belongs to Alex is red."

Means the same as

"Alex's car is red."

2) Apostrophes are used to connect two words in a contraction:

He cannot have any ice cream.

Means the same as

He can't have any ice cream.

3) If the noun is *singular*, the apostrophe comes before the "s."

If the noun is *plural*, the apostrophe comes after the "s".

The teacher's apple is delicious.

The teachers' apples are delicious.

#### **Common Error:**

Using an apostrophe with *possessive pronouns*:

Incorrect: The cake was our's.

Correct: The cake was ours.

*Survivor* by Chuck (pronounce it however you like) Palahniuk Orion Fitzhenry

I loved Chuck's writing before I ever read it. His book, *Fight Club*, entered my life, in movie form, in my early adolescence and had a profound effect on me afterwards (as it did for many angry, young men). It's clear, concise and contains no unnecessary words. Whenever I finish one of his books, I return to the real world itching to get back to Chuck's beautiful paradox's and twisted descriptions of twisted feelings. He has written many books, so I never go wanting for long.

*Survivor* is told from the perspective of Tender Branson, a man in his thirties who is somewhat removed from the world in which he lives. As the second son in his family, Tender left his home to be the help of the wealthiest of people as soon as he turned eighteen. Originally, he did this at the behest of the Creedish cult which raised him so that he could send his earnings back, but now his world has changed as the cult has disappeared from the world as cults often do. That's pretty much the plot of the book, although it takes a sharp right turn around the halfway mark.

This book is dark, but it can be fun if you're willing to go through the pain that the characters go through. If you don't mind feeling the complete loneliness and disillusionment of another person, there is a fun and (somewhat) uplifting story waiting for you. The content of this book may keep some readers away. It probably earns a solid R rating, in my opinion. Chuck hits hard and you rarely see it coming. This is a great, short book that stayed with me long after I put it down.



A Way Through *The Way of Kings* by Brandon Sanderson Orion Fitzhenry

In the intermittent minutes between classes and tutoring sessions, I've been living in Roshar. A world of stone and storms where humanity fights at the edge of the world over shattered ground for its survival. Clocking at 1,200+ pages, *The Way of Kings* is the first book in The Stormlight Archive, a projected ten book series from fantasy author Brandon Sanderson. There are times in the book where the story drags the pacing lags nearly to a halt, but all the while groundwork is being played down for the epic story that lies ahead. It's a long haul of a rowan that's well worth the effort in the end.

The story follows three main characters; Kaladin, a surgeon turned soldier turned slave, Dalinar Kholin, the king's uncle, and Shallan Davar, a thief pretending to be a scholar to save her family's name. The book is rich with cohesive world building and awe-inspiring magic systems which make the story rewarding enough to stick through the. It's not always easy to get through the slow parts at times, but it's well worth the effort. By the end of the story enough is answered and enough is left up to question that the series holds promise.

*The Way of Kings* is a great novel for anyone wanting to lose themselves in a densely packed world with no end in sight. The book contains some grisly violence at times but is a good book for general audiences overall.
